## Mainstreaming Biodiversity: Tourism and fisheries management

## **Description:**

Tourism and fisheries are often the primary economic drivers on islands. Islands are also microcosms for the world: like other areas, but in special ways, problems in islands are interconnected and require multi-sector solutions. For instance, poor water quality can cause health problems, discourage tourism, and contribute to the decline of coral reefs. Disappearing reefs harm fisheries and also impact tourism. On the other hand, integrated application of SDGs and sustainable development of fisheries and tourism can go hand in hand, with coordinated approaches to tourism's food supply chain benefiting sustainable fisheries and well-managed ecosystems providing benefits to both sectors.

This event contributes to the overall objective of the Rio Pavilion and the CBD COP 13 of mainstreaming biodiversity into development sectors by showcasing solutions from islands, and from other States, as tourism destinations and "biodiversity hotspots". The session will build on the experiences of the Global Island Partnership, a cooperation platform for island States and States with islands that supports implementation of the CBD's Programme of Work on Island Biodiversity, to showcase island solutions that are building resilience and driving implementation of the Aichi Targets, the SAMOA Pathway and the SDGs. The sessions will share examples of how better to incorporate and integrate ecosystem services, ecosystem-based adaptation and resilience to climate change, and measures to reduce and stop the rate of biodiversity loss, into tourism planning, development and operations at a global scale. The second part of the day will focus on integrating sustainable fisheries management into wider sustainable development frameworks including tourism. While the sessions will focus on islands, other States will also share their views and discussions will not be limited to any group of Parties.

## **OBJECTIVES:**

- 1) Discuss and highlight, with national and subnational governments, the private sector, international and UN agencies, NGOs and civil society, effective practices and approaches to mainstreaming biodiversity into tourism development
- 2) Identify links and synergies in destinations between biodiversity, sustainable tourism development, and sustainable fisheries' management
